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Cybercrime is getting more serious by the month. Hackers are getting smarter about tricking people into clicking on fraudulent links or opening up malicious attachments in emails.

Increasing our organization's security awareness is imperative to us. Last year, the Archdiocese of Atlanta partnered with KnowBe4, a security awareness training organization, to help us create a "human firewall" against malicious emails that land in our employees' inboxes. In addition, our Office of Archives and Records offers [information](#) on how to dispose records securely.

A couple of months ago, we [switched](#) our marketing/communications tool from Constack Contact to MailChimp since it has better information security, including two-factor authentications.

As part of these efforts, we would like to share with you a brand new [cybersecurity resource](#) designed for small-to-medium sized businesses, non-profits and religious organizations. This tool, developed by the Attorney General Consumer Protection Division, is intended to raise awareness of cyber issues and provide practical information you can use to ensure you are protecting your data and your parishioners' data.
